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Main impact of COVID-19 on Venezuelan refugees and migrants


For the **5,1 million** Venezuelan refugees and migrants the main impacts have been:

- Loss of livelihoods and housing
- Prompted returns in adverse conditions
- Increase in street begging and bottlenecks
- along borders, raising health risks
- No inclusion in national systems responses
- Lack of adequate quarantine facilities
- Increasing xenophobia and discrimination






Migration Routes

Government Responses to the COVID-19 Pandemic in the region

- **Brazil:** the Federal Government launched an emergency basic income program for workers in the informal sector as well as the self-employed, and extended benefits to Venezuelan refugees and migrants.
- **Colombia:** the Colombian government launched a 6-point plan to integrate refugees and migrants in the COVID-19 national response, guaranteeing access to the health system for all Venezuelan refugees and migrants.
- Governments of both Panama and Colombia have suspended evictions for their citizens, as well as Venezuelan refugees and migrants, during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- **Peru:** the President signed an executive decree authorizing a special service called SERVICER in which health care professionals, including Venezuelan refugees and migrants, can enroll and be employed.
- Argentina: following the Presidential proclamation on the State of Emergency, the Board of Medical Health Professionals has provided a provisional permit for Venezuelan doctors to support state efforts.
